AGENDA ITEM #6: RATES ADVISORY COMMITTEE (RAC)

MS. K. GARCIA: So, now, what I'd like to do -- I'm just going to pause. We are at a point now where we can turn to some of the agenda items. And I know a priority discussion is the right -- Rate Advisory Committee. I just want to offer -- we have, as I mentioned, our President and CEO, Paula Gold-Williams, and a number of our senior chiefs on the call today. So I just want to offer an opportunity, if they have any opening remarks, and otherwise we will transition into the Rate Advisory Committee. So I'll pause for just a

1 moment. 2 MS. P. GOLD-WILLIAMS: Kathy, this is No -- no, ma'am. I don't really have anything. 3 Paula. I want to listen, and -- and I think there 4 were some really good topics, and I saw some of the 5 preliminary information we even got today. So, no, I --6 I just want to just jump into it and -- and listen. 8 MS. K. GARCIA: Okay. Thank you, Paula. 9 So one reminder before we start our -- our 10 discussion, we will try to make sure everybody is muted just to cut down on background noise. If you can, try 11 to use the hand feature or as also has been directed, in 12 13 the "chat" box you can also type questions. And again, 14 we're going to do all we can to monitor that activity. 15 We want this to be conversational, yet it's a -- we have to find ways to do that effectively here. 16 17 So with that, we're going to turn to the 18 discussion on the Rate Advisory Committee. And we have 19 a -- a very brief update, but -- but there has been activity occurring on this item and, I believe, Carolyn 20 21 Shellman, our Chief Legal Officer and General Counsel, is going to provide a brief update, and then we'll -- we 22 would welcome input and thoughts. Carolyn? 23 24 MS. C. SHELLMAN: Okay. I'm un-muted, I think. 25

1 Good to not see everyone but know that we 2 can exchange information here. And I have been doing a lot of work on the Rate Advisory Committee. I know that 3 you all will remember that it was at the end of January, 4 on January 27th, that Mayor Nirenberg at the Board of 5 Trustees meeting raised the -- his request that our 6 Board consider creating a Rate Advisory Committee to review the utility's current and future rate structure 8 9 and its generation planning. The Board, I think, 10 believes that it's critical for CPS Energy customers to be informed about and given an opportunity to provide 11 12 input about the utility's rate design and the generation

On March 2nd, the Board adopted a resolution expressing support for the concept of this Rate Advisory Committee and directed the utility's management team to develop a committee framework to achieve the public input objective that the Mayor's proposal had raised, and Felecia Etheridge, and I, and Rudy Garza, now, have been doing work to create a framework for this Rate Advisory Committee.

The COVID-19 issue kind of interrupted some of our Board meetings and I think that that is one reason we've not had discussions about it in depth.

Paula's tried to keep everybody alerted to the fact that

we're still working on it, but we haven't had any kind of robust discussion at the Board meeting. But don't be concerned, we are working on it.

We released on March 11th an RFP to seek proposals for a rate consultant to work with the leadership team and the Board of Trustees and the Rate Advisory Committee. The responses to that RFP have come in. We had canvassed over 300 different kinds of consulting businesses to try to make sure that we got a wide array of responses and we got a number of them. I am one of the people that is reviewing those responses, and there's some really good ones there from some really capable respondees. So we're reviewing those, and within the next few weeks, we'll develop some kind of recommendation about who should be hired.

The chosen consultant will provide subject matter expertise on rate design and cost, and really what our utility's rate setting process is, and feedback and guidance to the Rate Advisory Committee. We will key up issues for the Rate Advisory Committee's consideration, take input from what the committee thinks it wants to talk about and do everything we can to have lots of public feedback, transparency, engagement, public input through the committee process.

So I'm excited about it and look forward

Part of the whole issue is the importance of getting enough real information to the committee so that they aren't just talking about abstractions but that they're getting some real data and so forth to look at; and also the importance of really engaging the -- the committee in a way that they learn enough to be able to make really useful advice to the -- the CPS Energy.

I've watched several different committees at SAWS and -- very impressed with some of them. I'm -- I'm less impressed with the way the Rate Advisory Committee is operating right now. I'm hoping that they can improve it. But I think that the kinds of things that they have done really well in terms of having well-informed committees on some of the other committees have been very, very impressive, and I for -- certainly,

I'm going to start on slide 4, and I want
to verify that everyone can see the presentation. I
think that's a good thumbs up, so I'll get right into
tit.

STEP was launched in 2009 with the vision of serving 771 megawatts over 12 years. CPS Energy exceeded that goal and achieved 833 megawatts in 11 years while being \$130 million under budget. This is well known and -- and -- and understood.

The thing is CPS Energy is, still committed to providing this value and we're committed to providing the next generation of the Save for Tomorrow Energy Plan by utilizing that 12th year of the program to design -- to design a robust package of products and services that offer value and benefit to all the citizens of San Antonio. This next generation program will be called FlexSTEP with an aim to deliver approximately 600 megawatts.

While we go through this design process we're continuing to deliver energy -- energy efficiency and conservation programs to our customers through a one-year STEP Bridge program approved by the City Council. This will provide for a continuation of valuable customer programs that benefit so many in our community.

1 Now, I'm going to go to slide 6.

2.2

And that being said, COVID-19 has had impacts on the STEP biz- -- Bridge program like has it on everything throughout our great city, state and country. And just like all of San Antonio we are learning as we go through and we continue to push towards a 75-megawatt goal. I want to emphasize that we're taking every precaution in our operation to ensure that we are keeping people safe. Just like all employees of CPS Energy -- People First.

So what does the next generation of STEP look like? While we are still deep in the design phase, I can tell you that it will be a generous mix of tried and true, along with a vision for tomorrow. The program will be customer focused and agile and offer a value to a broad spectrum of our customers.

It is also a commitment -- a commitment of resources, time and effort. We are searching to find new technology and innovations that our customers can utilize to increase efficiency. We're looking to expand our solar programs while bringing our new programs around electric vehicles and battery storage. We're committed to achieving the 600 megawatts while ensuring that all of our customers have the opportunity to participate.

1 That being said, there is a cost

2 associated with STEP program and I want to be sure that

- there is clear awareness that this progress is not free.
- 4 | Over the course of the STEP program CPS Energy customers
- 5 | bore an average bill impact of \$2.78 per month.
- 6 | Additionally, for the STEP Bridge year we're looking for
- 7 | a target bill impact of around \$3.43 per month.
- 8 One of the reasons we feel so confident
- 9 | that Flex -- that the FlexSTEP program will be so
- 10 | successful is that we'll be utilizing a mixture of
- 11 | programs that have proven and reliable value.
- 12 | We will match these programs to programs
- 13 | that are innovative but show significant potential in
- 14 terms of savings and energy savings. We'll operate in
- 15 an agile and flax- -- flexible manner by continuously
- 16 | monitoring the efficacy of programs and as opportunistic
- 17 or as needed we will introduce new programs that show
- 18 promise and sunset programs that are underperforming.
- 19 Finally, I want to share with you the
- 20 proposed timeline and highlight the points that we are
- 21 | moving very fast to deliver this program for the City of
- 22 | San Antonio.

And as I said, I have -- probably have some questions because I don't know enough about all the different ways by which you can go forward on this. But I'm very eager to see as much of that as possible happening as soon as possible.

And -- and, also, I'm especially eager to see the PACE program also going forward. I'm very glad that that got approved already and hope that this -- the -- the financial fallout from the -- the COVID19 issues, I hope that doesn't prevent those from being taken care of as quickly as possible.

something that we discovered in the climate action

planning process, and that is that a number of cities

are having ordinances that have the requirement that

before a house can be sold there has to be an energy and

a water efficiency measurement for that house. And I

think once we start getting that kind of thing going

here in San Antonio, it'll make a big difference.

One of the kinds of things that some of the other cities have been doing is to also then supply families with the upgraded energy efficient appliances. So, for example, in El -- El Paso they literally gave low-income families who had old, old, old refrigerators that were wasting a lot of energy, they gave them appliances and very quickly got the energy reduction down. So it's worth doing.

And the timing of that consultant is -- is 11 happening and it -- and it -- it -- it's imminent, so 12 we -- we will have a consultant on board here in the --13 14 in the near future. 15 Now, when the -- the RFP for the FlexPOWER 16 Bundle goes out, I think we want to have a stakeholder 17 process there to really kind of get input on that. 18 There are also some supply chain things that we're kind 19 of looking through on how COVID has affected supply chains, especially in those -- in the -- in the area of 20 So we are looking at that and seeing what kind 21 22 of impact that that will have on the ultimate RFP for 23 the FlexPOWER Bundle. 24 And I would say -- and again, I get -- go back to my sort of response to Chrissy's question. 25

It -- we are trying to think about the FlexPOWER Bundle
RFP in two ways: One is, you know, it's going to be
replacing to fossil capacity, so, you know, it's going
to be a big deal. But we really have to figure out how
it meets our load requirements, and so that all-source
component to firm up the solar will be a critical piece
of it.

We also want to see if we can put a -- a larger DG component to it so it can really -- we can see more of that solar showing up in San Antonio and jobs associated with that which is ultimately good for the -- for the community as well. So that's the added piece that we've been thinking about here recently.

MS. K. WHITE: Well, personally, I guess my question is about the timing and it sounds like the timing is uncertain. I guess, I'm wondering the magnitude of that uncertainty, you know, in part, because, you know, the solar investment tax credit is declining at the end of this year, and then at the end of next year and -- you know, so tech- -- timing, you know, does matter. And not to mention that, you know, getting -- getting that solar on the grid has environmental benefits, so, you know, indefinite kind of waiting also has -- has a cost in terms of -- certainly,

- So I know, Kaiba, sometimes you do some deep thinking about gas and how -- and how it should or shouldn't be part of this mix. I don't know if you wanted to briefly touch on that or if we just want to listen and -- and hear -- and hear what folks have to say.
- MS. K. WHITE: I mean, I -- I think the -the -- the letter that we -- the memo that we put
  together regarding our position on natural gas use and
  expansion, I think -- not that letter shares all of our
  thoughts. There's, I guess, more that could be said.
  But I think those -- those are the big ones that, you

  think, at least, the majority of the -- the people here
